Welcome to ACELG 2012. We're planning another very busy year of research, projects, education and training programs and other events, and look forward once again to working with many of our colleagues in local government and related organisations.

2011 was highly productive. By the end of the year around 40 major projects or reports had been completed or were well under way and will be finished in early 2012. More information on a number of those projects is provided later in this

newsletter. Highlights included the annual workforce Development Forum, completion of a draft national Local Government Workforce Strategy and practice note on Long Term Financial Planning, the inaugural ACELG-ANZSOG Excellence in Local Government Leadership program, launch of the Graduate Certificate in Local Government Leadership in NSW and the Northern Territory, and the national Researchers Forum held in December.

2012 will see the compilation and publication of a series of national minimum data sets on various aspects of local government, the launch of the National Assessment Framework for asset and financial management, another series of research projects, ongoing development of IKEN (Information and Knowledge Exchange Network), the second Excellence in Local Government Leadership program, further expansion of the Advancing Leadership and Learning in Local Government initiatives, completion of a draft Aboriginal and Torres Strait Employment in Local Government strategy, and much more.

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## 2011 Researchers Forum



Over 100 local government researchers from Australia and New Zealand participated in ACELG's second Research Forum, held at the University of Technology, Sydney, on 14 and 15 December.

The Forum's theme was 'Local Governance in Transition' and featured papers from universities, Councils, State Government departments, research consultants and PhD students.

The papers broadly covered new approaches to local governance and community engagement, governance challenges for rural, remote and indigenous councils, structural reform and financing

options, workforce challenges in the context of demographic change, and responses to making the physical environment more sustainable.

Professor Attila Brungs, UTS Deputy Vice-Chancellor and Vice-President (Research) said: "Research is a priority to support evidence-based policy formulation, promote informed debate on key policy issues. It enables local government to play a constructive role in informing and addressing national agendas as the Australian federation evolves. Prior to ACELG local government had been poorly resourced to do this."

ACELG Director Professor Graham Sansom added: "We wanted to bring researchers and practitioners together so that local government focused research is a 'solid value' proposition for the sector – councils, associations and other organisations – and is relevant to places, communities and local agendas."

One of the highlights of the Forum was a (light-hearted) debate on whether 'politics' or 'research' was more influential in shaping local government policy. The debate Chair, Erica Bell put the proposition that: "Researchers are from Venus, local government is from Mars: Politics, not evidence, shapes policy". John Martin and Greg Hoffman argued for the affirmative, and Melissa Gibbs and Tim Robinson presented the counter view. Of course both positions are inextricably linked but the debate highlighted key 'realities' that can arise when shaping and implementing local government policy.

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# **Future Focus on Local Government Regions**

The Northern Sydney Regional Organisation of Councils (NSROC) has collaborated with ACELG on a study comparing the structures, operations and activities of various Regional Organisations of Councils (ROCs) in New South Wales and similar groups in Western Australia. The report outlines the variety of ROCs (or council alliances) in the two States and suggests some future directions, including the greater use of ROCs by State and Federal Governments as an important channel for regional



funding and consultation and as a mechanism to enhance local government performance.

The report is timely, especially for NSW councils, as the NSW Government is asking councils to explore greater usage of ROCs. Currently these organisations advocate for councils across regions and run shared services and regional projects on councils' behalf. Carolynne James, NSROC Executive Director, said: "It is important to understand what the 17 ROCs do across NSW, how they operate, and the value they can provide to councils, to communities, and to regions."

The analysis is important for understanding the function of ROCs and their relationships between local councils and different levels of government. ROCs have a varied impact around Australia; some ROCs have led to major reforms including council consolidation, while in other circumstances they have enhanced their member councils' capacity and performance.

NSROC and ACELG jointly funded the project which was undertaken by Gooding Davies Consultancy Pty Ltd. The report includes recommendations to explore appropriate legal and business structures for ROCs that allow for more efficient business operations, and how ROCs could provide a greater regional consultation function. 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# **Community Engagement Research**

The Research and Policy Foresight program has completed significant work over the past few months on community engagement and community governance themes, including:

- Community Engagement and Local Government in Australia;
- Community Engagement Resources for Local Government: An Annotated Bibliography;
- The UK Transition Network and Community Governance; and
- Local Government and Community Governance: Building on What Works



ACELG staff held a consultation in November to discuss research findings with local government practitioners and look at the implications for practice. The event was hosted by the City of Melbourne and included participants from councils and the local government organisations, MAV, VLGA and LGAT. 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# Learning in Local Government



Through its 'Learning in Local Government' project, ACELG seeks to make further education and learning in local government more accessible nationally, as well as and strategically relevant in view of contemporary challenges and themes faced by the sector. Recent developments include:

- The LGMA Management Challenge will now be a subject in the Graduate Certificate in Local Government Leadership, a university postgraduate program developed by ACELG and the Centre for Local Government at the University of Technology, Sydney. This means Challenge participants can now have the option of gaining entry to post-graduate study. View the news items here.
- ACELG leadership subjects have been adapted into Edith Cowan University's Graduate Certificate in Leadership program, and the UTS Graduate Certificate is being run through Charles Darwin University in the Northern Territory with NT government support (more information here). ACELG Partner, UTS -CLG ran a Leadership Skills course in Alice Springs in December, and 'New Perspectives in Local Government Leadership' is scheduled for Perth early next year. Programs in Tasmania and South Australia are planned for 2012.
- An eLearning Portal is now available via ACELG's IKEN site. It provides an online platform for the exchange of ideas, experiences and resources around eLearning in local government across Australia. The site features:
  - Listings of existing eLearning programs and initiatives in local government across Australia and internationally
  - Web-based solutions and technologies for eLearning including tools, software, applications, services, devices and websites
- A summary document 'eLearning in Local Government' is available here.
- A review of councillor training is underway that explores the scope of available programs for elected representatives each State and Territory. Research and interviews have been undertaken with local government associations, RTOs, educational institutions, professional associations, and government agencies, and the findings will be released shortly.

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# Workforce Strategy

ACELG partner, LGMA (National) will soon release a National Workforce Strategy following comment and feedback from the sector. The implementation of priority projects from this work will then be determined at the 2012 Workforce Development Forum to be held in April. Other news from this area of ACELG's work includes:

- The development of a 'Managing Local Government's Mature Talent' strategy (plus report), planned for the first quarter of 2012; and
- The progression of demonstration projects related to the Indigenous Employment in Local Government strategy (more information here).

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# **Rural-Remote and Indigenous Councils**

Findings from a project undertaken for the Rural-Remote and Indigenous Local Government program will soon be released. Called 'Roles and



expectations of rural-remote and indigenous councils', the research is part of an overall strategy to identify key steps in building the capacity of small rural-remote and Indigenous councils across Australia – and especially in the north – to deliver adequate and appropriate local government services to their communities.

The research reviews the revenue and expenditure patterns of 70 remote-

rural and indigenous councils across Western Australia, the Northern Territory and Queensland. It also examines the diversity in roles, functions and capacity across the group of councils, along with differences in functional priorities of individual councils which reflect geography, demography and economic circumstances. 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# Long Term Financial Planning

ACELG partner, the Institute of Public Works Engineering Australia (IPWEA) has now completed preparation of a practice note on Long Term Financial Planning. This project was funded by the federal government through the Local Government Reform Fund (LGRF). Several inquiries into local government have highlighted the need for improved financial planning as an essential step towards ensuring that councils remain sustainable and capable of delivering adequate local services. At the same time, most state governments now require some form of medium-long term financial plan. The practice note provides a generic framework for meeting this challenge. It has already been road-tested as part of the LGRF rollout in NSW.
