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#### **Labour Market Performance**


- Despite the Global Recession, the Australian labour market remains relatively strong.
- Latest labour market statistics (seasonally adjusted):

	February 2010	Annual change
Unemployment rate	5.3%	0.0 pts
Employment	10 971 100	1.6%
Participation rate	65.2%	-0.3 pts




## **Employment growth**

Annual Employment Growth (%) - Australia - Total, Full-Time and Part-Time 10 years to February 2010 (trend)




#### Hours worked

## Recovery from the Global Recession

#### 2009-10 Mid-Year Economic and Fiscal Outlook:


- The "Australian economy has performed better than expected since the 2009-10 Budget" and is "...the strongest growing economy in the developed world".
- "The unemployment rate rose 1.5 % pts in the year leading up to the (2009-10) Budget, but has proven remarkably resilient since that time, remaining broadly unchanged since Budget."

National Resources Sector Employment Taskforce Discussion Paper, March 2010:

• Total construction employment for upcoming major resource projects may be up to 100 000, and that operational employment may be around 30 000 (DEEWR analysis of unpublished ABARE data).


## Industry employment growth

One year to February 2010 ('000) (trend)




### Industry employment growth

Five years to February 2010 ('000) (trend)




## Future industry job growth

Five years to 2014-15 ('000) - DEEWR projections




### Top 10 industry growth sectors

#### **Employment in Local Government Administration**


- Employment in Local Government Administration grew by 22.7% to 116 000 in the five years to 2009 (annual average). This compares with an increase of 12.0% in All Industries over the same period.
- In 2009, employment in Local Government Administration made up 25.4% of total employment in the Public Administration sector, compared with 22.8% five years ago.
- Share of employment in the Public Administration sector (annual average):

Central Govt Administration	39.4%	28.3%
State Govt Administration	33.5%	38.0%
Local Govt Administration	22.8%	25.4%


## Occupational employment growth

1 year and 5 years to February 2010 ('000) (trend); 5 years to 2014-15 ('000) - DEEWR projections




#### Employment growth by Skill level (Qualifications)

## Ageing Workforce


2009 average

- Around half of the workforce in Agriculture, Forestry and Fishing; Education and Training; and Health Care and Social Assistance are aged 45 years or older.
- The median age of the workforce is 39 years.


• The median age for Local Government Administration in 2009 is 45.5 years, compared with 39.0 years in All Industries.

## Working Age Population Projections

- The Australian population is expected to increase from around
   22 million people currently to 35.9 million in 2050.
- The working age population (15-64 years) is projected to increase by 44% between 2010 and 2050.
- However, as a proportion of the total population, the working age population is expected to decrease by around 7 % pts.
- The aged-to-working ratio (proportion of people aged 65 and over to people aged 15 to 64 years) is projected to be 20% in 2010, increasing to 37.6% by 2050.



## What can employers do?

- Understand your workforce and respond to risks:
  - Take an age audit
  - Monitor staff turnover
  - Develop an action plan to manage the risks of an ageing workforce and staff turnover
- Look beyond the traditional sources of labour:
  - Parents
  - People with disabilities
  - Mature age workers
  - NESB workers
  - Indigenous
- Improve workplace flexibility
- Implement retention strategies
- Training

## Improving Workplace Flexibility

- Innovative responses some Australian employers are suggesting include:
  - Phased retirement
  - Increased education and training
  - Increasing access to flexible working hours
    - Job sharing
    - Part-time work
  - Apprenticeships / traineeships
  - Growing their own skills base
  - Modify workplace / operations
