Centre has commissioned the Institute of Public Works Engineering Australia (IPWEA) to develop a practice note for asset management for small, rural and remote communities. IPWEA is a member of the ACELG consortium.

The practice note has been successfully piloted with a group of seven small, rural councils in Western Australia in October 2010, with a further pilot conducted with eight rural councils in South Australia. The practice note will enable small rural councils to develop asset management plans, and will ensure the achievement of a nationally consistent approach to asset management.

The practice note will be launched in March and will be provided free of charge to councils with a population less than 5,000.

Minister Crean Approves Funding for National Local Government Data Project



Federal Local Government Minister, the Hon Simon Crean, has approved an allocation of \$700,000 from the Local Government Reform Fund for ACELG to implement the National Local Government Data Project – a key component of the Local

Government Reform Fund and a major national priority endorsed by the Local Government and Planning Ministers Council (LGPMC).

The funding allocation will enable ACELG to compile and maintain a series of data sets linked to the National Local Government Workforce Strategy, an assessment framework for asset and financial management, and guidelines for long term financial planning.

In carrying out the projects, ACELG will work closely with State and Territory governments, and with a broad range of local government associations and stakeholders. The projects will begin in late February 2011. Stay tuned for further updates.

National Strategy to Build Capacity in Rural-Remote and Indigenous Local Government



At its December 2010 meeting, the ACELG board endorsed a National Strategy to Build Capacity in Rural-Remote and Indigenous Local Government. The strategy is the

culmination of an extensive research and consultation process undertaken by the Centre and its program partners, including a National Roundtable held in July 2010 to set the priority areas for attention. The strategy aims to identify key steps to build the capacity of small-remote and Indigenous councils across Australia – and especially in northern Australia – to deliver local government services to their communities.

ACELG has established a National Reference Group to oversee strategy activities, assist in determining national priorities and more formally engage the jurisdictions, state associations, professional associations and ACELG partners.

The course was tailored to meet the needs of aspiring leaders in WA. During the five-day program, participants

studied theoretical and practical aspects of the challenges of leadership in local government. Highlights included breakfast with the Minister for Local Government, the Hon John Castrilli, presentations from leading council CEOs and site visits.
